

After school sailing starts again in Week 3 of Term 1 – Monday 11th February 2019. Any student in Year 4, Year 5 or Year 6, who is a competent swimmer, is able to join in with dinghy sailing in the Tackers Course. The students pair up in the boats in Tackers 1 and move onto solo sailing in Tackers 2. Those students who sailed in Term 3 of 2018 will be completing the Tackers 2 course; new comers will be in Tackers 1.

Safety is the first priority in sailing, so all students wear buoyancy life jackets, and the NCYC provides fully qualified instructors to teach and supervise the students. Novices to sailing are welcome, as all students are instructed on knowledge of boats, equipment, preparing a boat for sailing, understanding wind, using ropes, points of sail, skills and techniques of sailing. It is such a fun afternoon out on the water.

RISK WARNING

All sailing activities conducted on Newcastle Harbour and surrounding waters by the Newcastle Cruising Yacht Club (herein known as NCYC) are under a Sailing Event Notification System issued by NSW Roads & Maritime Service (herein known as RMS).

This Risk Warning is issued jointly by the NCYC and RMS, pursuant to the Civil Liability Act 2002 to all persons wishing to participate in the sailing activities conducted by the NCYC.

Participants are warned that, regardless of the precautions, which might be taken by reasonable and experienced persons, sailing can be a dangerous pursuit and participants are exposed to significant risk of property damage, physical harm and possibly death.

Participants are advised of the risks relating to Newcastle Harbour and that Newcastle Harbour is a salt water coastal inlet with deep water access to the open ocean. Bulk carriers and other large vessels are present in the harbour and present a risk of collision. Sharks, dolphins and other marine animals are present in the Harbour and present a risk of injury.

As an indication, these risks may include, but are not limited to:

- severe and unpredictable weather and sea conditions;
- the potential that control of vessels may be lost, resulting in collision with objects and other vessels;
- the sudden movement of the vessel at any time;
- the possibility that participants may fall or be thrown overboard, resulting in drowning;
- the possibility that participants may be injured by equipment on the vessel;
- the absence of immediate medical care and the likelihood that significant delays may occur before medical care is available;
- exposure to the elements for extended periods; and
- the presence of dangerous marine life.

The NCYC and RMS also warn participants that regardless of their best intentions, they may be unable to render assistance to participants who are in distress. There is a risk that emergency medical assistance may be delayed.

Participants are warned to consider the above risks and all other risks before deciding to participate in any sailing event with the NCYC.
